

This transformation is happening at NOSD through the use of a variety of outdoor green spaces including the NOSD Forest, NOSD Backyard, and Pollinator Prairie.

Her role as SIR is an environmental educator who collaborates with teachers, staff, and students as a key part of the team. 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There is no denying the fact that in today's economic environment the decline in workforce weighs heavily in many industries. Due to this, Ozaukee High School is actively taking steps to make a positive impact to empower tomorrow's workforce.

High school education serves as the foundation for students' future careers and goals. While rigorous coursework is without a doubt essential, it is equally important to prepare students for the practical demands of the workforce. Offering career-ready opportunities in high school is an essential aspect of education that can empower students with the skills, experiences, and confidence they need to succeed in a chosen career. Over the past several years our Tech Ed department has installed a CNC Mill, CNC Lathe, Robotic Arm and a two post hoist. These machines aide in preparing our students to utilize similar machinery in the workforce. In the 2023-24 school year alone, OHS is taking strides to prepare students for the workforce by introducing two new classes: Learning to Lead and Auto Services 1.

Learning to Lead is a required class for all OHS Sophomores. In this class, students engage in various activities that closely replicate what the workforce will be like after leaving Ozaukee High School. For example, in September a panel of industry leaders presented to the class in the NOSD Fine Arts Center. Panel members had a conversation about various employability skills students will need to be successful in the workforce and in general to be a successful citizen. The panel not only helped the students gain important insight into specific industries, it allowed students to network with potential employers and make meaningful connections in a safe setting.



advancements in our Tech Ed department to align with career readiness; this year is no different. It is evident when you walk into the Tech Ed classrooms that students are engaged in meaningful work that is preparing them for workplace certifications, apprenticeships, and more. Mr. Kornely is trailblazing with the addition of the Auto Services 1 class and Auto Club during resource time. Through these offerings, students get the industry experience of conducting oil changes, tire rotations, basic diagnostics, and PDI's (Pre Delivery Inspection) within their school day. This not only prepares students for a potential career in automotives, but to simply be a responsible car owner.

NOSD has successfully written and received grants worth over \$970,000. These grants have aided in advancements in technology, first class learning environments, and expanding our outdoor education program and green spaces on campus. Without this partnership many of these advancements would not have been possible.

We want to extend our sincere gratitude to our local businesses, community members, organizations, parents, teachers, and all those who tirelessly work to create and sustain community partnerships with NOSD. District Financial Snapshot:

As another budgeting cycle has recently wrapped up for the District, planning for the next year has already begun. What may seem like a never ending cycle in the District's Business Office, a team of staff members are constantly working on managing the District's finances and processing transactions.

The school board approved the annual budget for the 2023-24 fiscal year in October. Here are a few key takeaways from the budget:



A Balanced Budget was approved



Student Enrollment Count of 694 was the highest since 2018



Total School Tax Levy of \$7.55 million decreased from the previous year



District is operating on the same level of state-imposed revenues (revenue limit) as the 2008-09 school year



School reserves are currently at the District's target level to avoid short-term borrowing



Our students are responsible for hypothesizing, analyzing, and reflecting in nature during this three day field trip at H.H. Peters Youth Camp located within Hawthrone Hills Park.


