WALKING THE PATH OF A WARRIOR: How NOSD is Living its Core Values:

At NOSD, preparing students for life beyond the classroom isn't just a goal; it's a driving force for success at all grade levels, 4K-12th. We believe that every student is on an individual journey- a path of growth, purpose, and achievement. That is why we've embraced the **PATH of a Warrior** as the foundation of everything we do. PATH stands for Partnership, **A**chievement, **T**ransformation, and **H**elp- four values that define who we are, what we believe, and how we help prepare students for life beyond NOSD.

Over the past several years, we have been intentional about bringing the PATH to life. We strive to do this not only through lessons but also through relationships, opportunities, and shared commitment to helping every student reach their full potential.

While each of the values is equally important, we take pride in fostering partnerships with various stakeholders to provide a more enhanced learning experience for all of our students. This looks different at every level, however, each level fits together to foster meaningful partnerships.

Regardless of where our students are, they need to know there is a team of educators ready to assemble a PATH of opportunities to target their finish line. For students on a 4-year college track, we offer various Greyson Haack ('25) working to repair a tire at Jimmy B's. Greyson works for Jimmy B's through Ozaukee Youth Apprenticeship (OYA).

course options that either result directly in dual credit (high school and college) or potential future college credit. These options include Advanced Placement (AP), Cooperative Academic Partnership Program, which is offered through UW-Oshkosh (CAPP), and College Credit In High School, which is offered through UW-Green Bay (CCIHS)-college courses taught by OHS teachers, and the Early College Credit Program (ECCP).

Some of our students are on the PATH to becoming skilled trades professionals. The District has identified this as a need and has taken great strides to enhance our Tech Ed courses, offer certification testing, provide access to dual credit courses at our local Technical Colleges through Start College Now (SCN) and connect our students with local businesses and employers to experience firsthand what it takes to excel in certain trades.

Did you know that OHS Juniors and Seniors can participate in the Ozaukee Youth Apprenticeship Program (OYA)? OHS has consistently had 10 - 20 percent of eligible students participate in OYA. Students are provided the opportunity to be employed in areas of future interest and perform work that is often restricted to 18-year-olds. The required 450 hours give students a comprehensive experience and help them picture what it would be like in that role. In addition, hours earned as a youth apprentice can be credited toward the required hours as an adult apprentice.

Another opportunity for our Junior and Senior students is the Work Study program. When combined with the required WI Employability Skills Course, this allows our upperclassmen the chance to turn work into credit and earn a state employability skills certificate. By partnering with local employers, students develop a comprehensive awareness of valuable skills that help them find employment success.

While it is easy to focus on partnerships that happen towards the end of the journey, it is important not to lose sight

of the ones that students engage with towards the starting line. When thinking about partnerships at the elementary level, we do not have to look far. Some of the most notable school and community based partnerships are with both the Fredonia and Waubeka Fire Departments, Port Washington State Bank, the Saukville VFW, and the Village of Fredonia. In addition, we have selected students to participate in the annual Association of Wisconsin-Area Kodaly Educators (AWAKE) choir, and make ornaments and cards for Project Angel Hugs: a non-profit organization out of Plymouth, Wisconsin that brings joy to children facing with cancer.

Another example of a partnership at the Middle School level is the school's work with the Fredonia Lions Club. Our Leo club partners with the Fredonia Lions Club to enhance their work in the community. This is done through fundraising and raising awareness.

As we continue walking the PATH of a Warrior, **P**artnership stands as a cornerstone of our mission- connecting students, educators, families, and community members in a shared commitment to student success. These partnerships, whether formed near the starting line or in the final stretch, are what make the journey rich with possibility and purpose. But our journey doesn't end here. In upcoming editions of the Warrior Connection newsletter, we'll take a closer look at how we **A**chieve our goals, **T**ransform our learning outside of the classroom, and **H**elp one another when challenges arise. You will not want to miss out on how we are walking the PATH of a Warrior at NOSD.

District Financial Snapshot

As the school year wraps up, so will the District's fiscal year. With the passing of NOSD's operational referendum in November 2024, the school district will end the year with a positive financial statement. Surplus from this year will be committed for future budget years, as the school district chose to ask for a flat dollar amount each year of the referendum and this will help cover needs in later years.

During the process of our operational referendum, it was communicated that "the school board plans to keep the school portion of the tax bills the same over the next four years." The school board was able to fulfill that plan in year one of the referendum, passing a budget in October with the same tax levy as the prior year - holding taxes the same across the district. Individual tax bills may have fluctuated slightly based on how the total taxes are allocated across municipalities and individual parcels, but most residents should have seen a very minimal change to the school portion of their tax bills.

Hiring additional teachers was part of the identified needs for the additional funds with the referendum. After the successful referendum, administration reviewed the needs of the large class sizes within the specific grade levels. It was identified that the 2nd grade classes would hire a teacher mid-year for 2024-25 - which the District was able to hire to address the immediate needs. The other two positions were determined that it was best to wait until the completion of the school year, in an effort to hire the best qualified candidates. NOSD is pleased to share that we have hired staff to fill these new positions for 2025-2026, prior to the last day of this school year.

Every other year, school districts must wait for the State of Wisconsin to pass their biennial budget before knowing what funding will be committed to school districts in the following two years. We are currently in the state's budget cycle, as of the end of May school districts have many questions related to the size of funding changes that will affect each district. One thing that is for certain for NOSD is that we are able to rely on the approved operational referendum funding over the course of next three years.

While there will continue to be future funding needs, NOSD can be proud of the current financial position of our district and grateful for the community support.

From the Principals

At Ozaukee Elementary, we're fortunate to have access to incredible outdoor spaces right here on our NOSD campus-including the school forest and the pollinator prairie, which provide amazing opportunities for hands-on learning and exploration.

Each quarter, our students and teachers head outside to connect classroom learning with the natural world. Through our community partnership with Riveredge Nature Center and support from our Scientist in Residence, Rachel Race, teachers have been developing engaging outdoor lessons that spark curiosity and deepen understanding.

This year, students explored a variety of topics outdoors: 4K studied winter animals in Wisconsin, kindergarteners practiced sorting and categorizing, 1st graders learned about animal habitats, and 2nd graders took a senses hike and wrote using figurative language. 3rd grade tracked weather patterns, 4th grade measured trees, and 5th grade studied different types of maps. Even our Encore classes—art, music, library, and phy ed-took learning outside!

We hope these experiences inspire students to keep exploring nature with their families all year long!

As we reflect on the 2024-25 school year, we want to celebrate the many accomplishments of our students and staff at Ozaukee Middle School.

The OMS LEO Club, led by advisor John Kirmse, volunteered at the Ozaukee Food Alliance and the Fredonia Lions Chicken Fry. All students completed Forward Testing, with grades 6-8 taking Reading and Math, and 8th grade also completing Science and Social Studies.

7th graders attended a career fair at Lakeshore Technical College, organized by Andy Gremminger with support from Sandy Henke. 8th grade visited the Illinois Holocaust Museum, organized by Lindsay McBride and Mrs. Henke. 6th graders showcased their coding projects for families and elementary students, thanks to Kevin Luedtke.
